CHRIST IS RISEN! HE IS RISEN INDEED!

You will all recognize the familiar Easter greeting that begins our Easter worship.

I love how the service begins in the dark reminding us not only

of the darkness of Good Friday, but the darkness and hopelessness we can encounter in our present lives.

And so, with hesitation, we go with the women to the tomb, knowing that what they found was not what they expected, what no one would have expected, an empty tomb. Seeing that empty tomb brought some mixed emotions, fear and joy, unbelief as well as wonder. Who could imagine such a thing?! In the gospel of Mark, they are so overwhelmed and afraid, they go home and don't tell anyone for a while. No one is sure if they didn't say anything to anyone because they didn't



think that anyone would believe them, or if they just needed some time to process everything.

And yet, they and other believers began to understand and trust that the unthinkable and unbelievable had happened. And with the power of the Holy Spirit their lives and the lives of many were changed forever as they went and not only told the good news, but lived that good news in their lives, lives now filled with hope, lives now filled with God's never-ending love.

We celebrate Easter year after year, it is meaningful to us. Yet in some ways it has been turned into a mere celebration of a past event, complete with meal and Easter baskets and chocolate. But Easter isn't simply a past event that we celebrate, but is also a part of our reality right now. The resurrection not only speaks about hope for us after we die a physical death, but promises new life, here and now, as God continues to breathe new life into us when we have suffered any number of deaths in our present lives: death of a loved one, death of a relationship, death of some of our hopes or expectations, all of those things that can lead us to despair. Easter is about new life here and now. Easter is about how Christ is still present with us in our daily lives, how God is always with us and for us. Easter is what gives us hope each morning and brings us peace each night.

Yes, Christ is risen. He is risen indeed! Happy Easter!





Blessed are you

The Beatitudes receive little attention, lamented novelist Kurt Vonnegut. "But, often with tears in their eyes, [Christians] demand that the Ten Commandments be



posted in public buildings. And, of course, that's Moses, not Jesus. I haven't heard [anyone] demand that the Sermon on the Mount, the Beatitudes, be posted anywhere."

Jesus' Beatitudes have much to teach about selflessness, mourning, peacemaking and more. Jim Berger, author of *Being Sermon on the Mount Christians*, explains that those teachings were once "viewed as a mandate for the faithful." Post-Reformation, they became less law-like and more of a "liberating directive." Berger writes, "For Jesus, being and doing are inseparable. The Sermon is at once theory and praxis. It is not enough to read it or hear it. Jesus intends it to be how we live."

When it rains

The skeleton flower, a perennial native to Japan, has delicate petals that change from opaque white to almost transparent when wet. After it rains, only the flower's intricate, skeleton-like veins are visible.

When the rains come (and they will!) in our lives, the same can be said. Amid difficulty and struggle, our true selves often become more transparent. During a parenting challenge, criticism might emerge. Or while we tackle a tough work project, impatience might rear its ugly head.

Hosea 6:3 (NLT) proclaims: "Oh, that we might know the Lord! Let us press on to know him. He will respond to us as surely as the arrival of dawn or the coming of rains in early spring." The rains will come. Whether you're experiencing light rain or a downpour, ponder what the water reveals. Then ask God how you can be more open to his work in that area.

Trustworthy Stewards

Superimposed Love

Maybe you've heard how salvation is like a total solar eclipse: God doesn't see our sins because Jesus' holiness covers them completely. Or maybe you've heard how trials can cause an "eclipse of faith."

At WorldChallenge.org, Pastor Gary Wilkerson explains that in Greek, *eclipse* means "I am absent" or "I cease to exist," because people once thought the gods temporarily extinguished the sun. "For Christians, a 'spiritual eclipse' is a dark hour when God seems to be absent from our lives," Wilkerson writes.

Wilkerson points to Peter being sifted like wheat, Elijah and Jeremiah facing extreme discouragement, and David collapsing morally. Amid Satan's attacks, "God seems completely absent," writes the pastor. "In that dark moment of eclipse, the devil has created such chaos we can't possibly see a way out." During times of testing, Christians must cry out to God and trust his faithfulness.

Completing the eclipse analogy, Wilkerson shares Titus 3:4, the "love of God our Savior appeared" (NIV). The Greek meaning of *appeared* here is *superimposed*, he writes. God looks on our fraught-filled times of eclipse and "superimposes his divine love over us."

Keep on Shining

Charles W. Naylor (1874-1950) was a traveling evangelist until misfortune struck. First a tentpole fell on him as he prepared for a meeting. A year later, a bus accident left him partially paralyzed.



Despite experiencing chronic pain, Naylor became a prolific author and hymnist, dictating almost 150 songs. He often wrote about God's loving care amid adversity. One of his hymns begins:

When the winds of persecution blow, When the streams of hatred tow'rd you flow, When your foes in number seem to grow, Just keep on shining.

"God's comfort in our times of sorrow is not an imaginary thing," Naylor wrote. "It can be so real that it is a balm for our wounded spirits. Having passed through the experience more than once, [I know] how real and vital and sustaining the comfort of God can be."



Use scrap paper to fuel new growth and make a gift that keeps on giving.

What you need:

- Scrap paper
- Water
- Herb or flower seeds
- Blender
- Strainer
- Cookie sheet
- Towel
- Adult help

What you do:

- Tear the scrap paper into strips and place in a bowl. Cover the paper with water and let it soak overnight.
- 2. Pour the mixture into a blender and blend about 10 seconds.
- 3. Strain and squeeze the paper pulp to remove excess water. Place in a bowl.
- 4. Sprinkle seeds over the pulp and mix to incorporate them into the pulp.
- 5. Shape the pulp into a flat layer on the cookie sheet. Use a towel to soak up excess water. Allow the paper to dry completely.
- 6. Tear paper into shapes or fold into a card. You can plant the paper directly into soil. Water it and then watch your plants grow!




